A KEY TO THE PRONUNCIATION
 OF THE SCRIPTURE PROPER NAMES.

EXPLANATION.

It is well known that the Scriptures are filled with many words of obscure derivation and meaning, and that it is difficult to determine their correct pronunciation. This difficulty is now removed, as the "New Self-Pronouncing Sunday-School Teacher's Bible" has been specially prepared to overcome it.

In the proper names the syllables are separated by hyphens (-), and the accented syllable is marked with the acute accent (´). This quantity of the vowel sounds, whether long, intermediate, or short, and their quality, whether broad, obtuse, obscure, or otherwise, as well as the value of the consonants, are shown in the following tables. By paying attention to this explanation, and applying it to the proper names in the text, the reader will easily learn to pronounce all of them correctly.
